

FOUR DAY WORKSHOP on POETRY WRITING SKILLS

The art of writing contemporary bush poetry has emerged as a strong interest within our membership, and the request for instruction has thus been met by providing an opportunity for you to participate in a Workshop on Poetry Writing Skills. This workshop will be held in November.

If your are (or know) someone who would appreciate some guidance in the construction of verse, this is the chance of a lifetime. 1999 Bronze Swagman Award winner for written poetry, Queensland's talented Carmel Randle has agreed to be our Workshop Leader and facilitator. Held over four sessions of two and a half hours, the workshop will take place in the new Melville Community Centre on the corner of Stock Road and Canning Highway (halfway between Perth and Fremantle). The course is exceptional value at just \$10 per person for the complete 10-hour course to be run over four mornings or four afternoons

The workshop is open to all aspiring writers of rhyming verse, and members are encouraged to spread the word to introduce their acquaintances to the pleasures of Australian bush poetry. Act now.

Another year has passed and our young association is beginning to show positive signs of maturity.

Membership has reached 140; the heats and final of our annual championship event were handled with an air of professionalism, thanks largely to Kel Watkins' vast experience. The first time that we have a cool Australia Day we will have an audience of 1000! The 38 to 40 degree heat for the last two years has deprived hundreds of people from enjoying some true blue Australian entertainment. It can only get better.

The dual champion (poetry and yarns) Peter Capp was justly rewarded for some creditable earlier near misses and has since contributed in a positive manner to the activities of the Association. It is gratifying to see members coming forward to put their shoulders to the wheel.

From Derby to Donnelly River and points in between – Corrigin (the Dog in the Ute show), Boyup Brook, Bridgetown, Northcliffe, Wongan Hills (Wonder what the Wongan crops are like?), our members have appeared (and performed), spreading the fun and message of bush poetry. There is movement in the municipality of Albany and seeds have been sown in Esperance. Let's hope that in the coming year the movement in Albany results in an active group of bush poets and the seeds sown in Esperance produce a healthy crop.

As I see it, that is one of the major functions of our organisation – spreading the message of bush poetry and yarnspinning with its attendant appreciation of the rich Aussie tradition.


Another major function is to encourage writers and performers of all ages and it is with a degree of joy and satisfaction that at last, the association, through its growing maturity, is launching a schools' competition, the first year for primary schools only, and for this we are indebted to Joan Macneall and Ron Evans. There is also the open poetry competition to be run and judge by our stalwart mate, Keith 'Cobber' Lethbridge. On behalf of all members I wish these workers well in their endeavours and we trust that both of these innovations will blossom into outstanding contributions to the conservation and promotion of the Australian idiom.

In last year's report I mentioned the yarnspinning segment of our activities and its merits or otherwise. There has been a tendency to confuse this with telling jokes, which is not what we are about. I have noticed that some of the well known events in that other country across the sea of sand are now making much play about yarnspinning, so maybe we were ahead of the pack when we included it initially and how fortunate we are to have in our ranks a yarnspinner of the calibre of the twice national champion Kel Watkins as a role model and mentor. The Albany devotees of Bush Poetry hope many other members will do the same. In anticipation, much has been planned for the Weekend of 19th, 20th, 21st November whilst Carmel is here.

ACCOMMODATION 19th & 20th NOVEMBER

Discovery Inn is definitely a good option for accommodation.

Full of country atmosphere with its large dining room and fire, plus the fact that the rooms are arranged around a sheltered, covered courtyard filled with plants and tables and chairs, members can expect a congenial weekend. Beds are fresh and comfortable and the rooms are very pleasantly furnished in pioneer style. Situated at Middleton Beach it is very convenient to everything. The breakfast is more than you can wish for, 3 or 4 cereals, compote of 2 or 3 fruits, toast and a choice of several jams and marmalade, plus peanut butter, vegemite, and so on, eggs, bacon, sausages, tomato, baked beans, tea and coffee. Select and eat as much as you wish. There is a communal tea making station (and fridge) available at all times.

There is mixed accommodation for 23 people, with rooms accessed by an internal verandah around three sides of the covered courtyard. There is one bathroom and toilet for the ladies and one for the men in the fourth wing of the verandah. Sorry, there are no facilities for children.

Normal rates for that weekend are as follows...

Right now, we can book the whole place for the entire weekend (Friday/Saturday night). Normal rates may be discounted if we register our interest early enough. An advance booking is advised.

But I believe plans are already afoot for next year's Mecca to Derby. Must be our beautiful weather at that time of the year. No offence Albany, but after having spent most of my life in Albany, it's great to be able to take dry washing off the line the same day you put it out!

Numbers were up by about 50 people on last year's count. A lot more local talent emerged; the morning flowed well with a blend of Bush poetry, humorous and other poetry, and musical ballads from our local people.

I am extending next year's activities to include a Bush Dance so let's hope *your* plans are coming along just fine!

LEGAL PERFORMANCE PROMPT

At the August meeting of The W.A. Bush Poets & Yarnspinners Assn Inc.,

the first new resolution of the incoming Committee (1999-00) was to provide the following ruling which states that at non-competitive gatherings,

A PERFORMANCE POET IS ENTITLED TO CARRY THE WRITTEN POEM AND/OR HAVE THE SERVICES OF A PERSON SEATED NEARBY TO ASSIST AS A PROMPT.

It is intended that this innovation will not only make the performances flow better, but will have the effect of instilling confidence in new, or very novice performers.

CARMEL RANDLE IN PROFILE

Born and raised in Brisbane, Queensland, Carmel Randle now calls a small property on the Darling Downs her home. In between, she has lived in many of the rural areas of that State.

Since retiring from Teaching, Carmel has indulged her love of writing and performing poetry by actively encouraging the artform in school students, assisting with the organisation of Bush Poetry Festivals, conducting Poetry Writing workshops, and through participation in Festivals throughout Australia and in the north-west of U.S.A. (See www.westfolk.org/live/ramfiles/friday6.ram for live performance at Elko NV 1999.

Her numerous Awards for written poetry include "The Bronze Swagman" twice (1996 & 1999, "The Blackened Billy" twice (1997 & 1998), and "Golden Gumleaf Book of the Year" for her Anthology, "Gone Bush!" (1997). She was the inaugural Reserve Champion Lady Performer of Australian Bush Poetry (an Award she has not since contested), and has twice won the "Battered Bugle" for Bush Poetry performance.

Carmel's Poetry can be enjoyed through her Anthologies, "Gone Bush!", "Many Faces", and "Mates!" (with Zita Horton) or on her Cassette and C.D., "There and Back!" With a small group of other Australian Bush Poets, her children's poetry is available in both the 1st and 2nd books of the series, "The Co-operative Books of Verse for Aussie Children".

For poets struggling with the technicalities of poetry, Carmel has published a best-seller, "Help! – A Handbook for Writers and Performers of Rhymed Verse".
