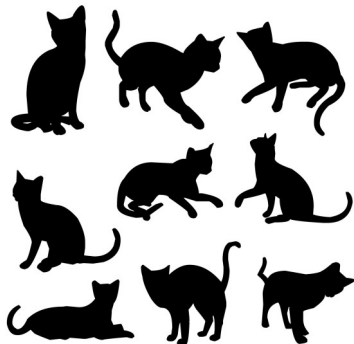

Bill Gordon Hanrahan by John O'Brien

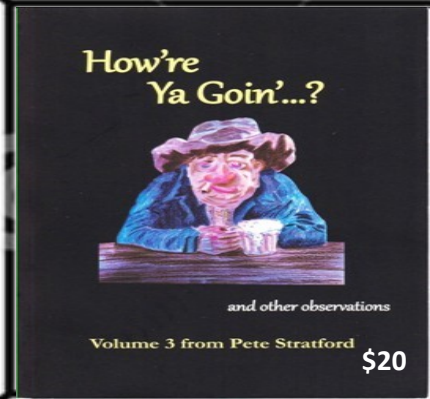
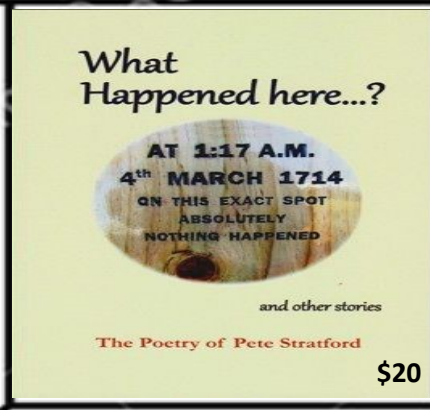
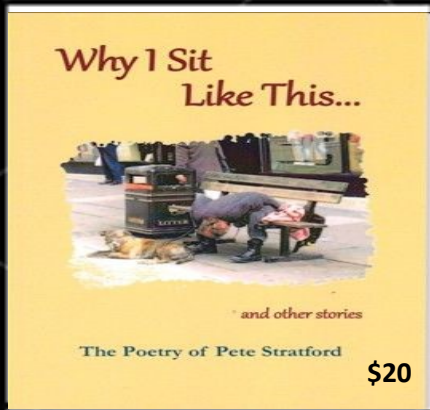
Throughout the changing season, the farmers talk about the weather, but Hanrahan always finds a chance and a reason to announce- "We'll all be rooned!"

Bill Gordon thanked **Rob Gunn** for an MC's job well done, and closed the Muster at 9.30pm (WA Time).



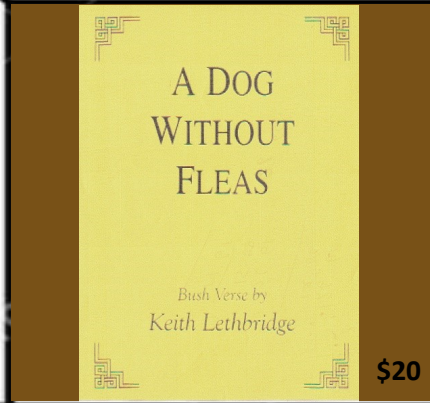

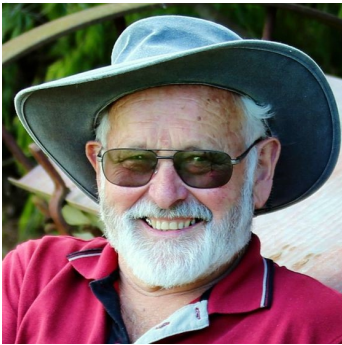

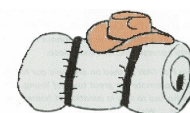
