Greetings from Derby, our favorite place at this time of the year. Derby races was a great day out. I even managed a small return on my investments on the tote. Meg scoured the fashion houses of Derby and came up with an outfit fit for a race day at Royal Ascot. Unfortunately the attendance at the Bush Poet's Breakfast was very disappointing in spite of our efforts promoting on social media and posters throughout Derby and all places on the way up.

Nevertheless all poets performed very well and the show was thoroughly enjoyed by those present. Bob Magor came out of retirement for the day and was as entertaining as ever. Bob was the star attraction at the first two Bush Poetry Breakfasts in Derby in 1998 and 1999. Cobber came up especially for the day and was excellent as always. 4500 Km round trip is true dedication from a well known and much loved Kimberley icon. Dave Morrell is a regular performer and, having lived and worked most of his life in the Kimberley, has poems he has written about some incredible stories about characters he has encountered up here.

Cait Westlake spent 25 years managing Mount House Station for her father, Frank McAlary. Cait wrote a very poignant poem about her father who, when he was a barrister in Sydney, was filmed dancing in the street at the end of WW2. He became known as "The Dancing Man" and was featured on the \$1 coin in 2005 to mark 60 years since the end of the war.

Meg did an excellent job as MC for the day and recited two poems. Meg, Alan Aitken and I made up the southern contingent of poets, Cobber of course being considered a Kimberley poet as he is back in the country where he feels most at home. Colin Pigram and the "Mango Mob" provided music to start the morning and then gave a Command Performance with Cobber to close the day. Special thanks to Ailsa Archer for her continued support assisting us run this event, and to Kerry Leamey from the Derby Sportsman's Club for coordinating the venue and the excellent breakfast. Without these two tireless Derby volunteers it would not be possible for us to manage to keep the show going.

Meg and I will be in Derby for another week performing in the caravan parks and I will enjoy a couple of rounds on the unique Derby Boabs golf course. Unique not only for the iconic boab trees throughout the course (including the middle of the fairways) but also for the race course that crosses several fairways as well. Naturally there is no golf played on race day.

After Derby we will head back to Broome where we will stay with Cait for a couple of weeks before turning south to (very) slowly make our way home where we plan to arrive mid-September for the southern run of poetry events.

Unfortunately that will mean that we will not be in Perth in time for the AGM. That will be held before the muster on Friday 1st September. Attachment No 2 - Competition Performance Conditions 2022

The WA Bush Poets & Yarnspinners Association (Association), in the strongest terms, discourages the inclusion in any performance, of any subject matter that could be considered unsuitable for family entertainment in accordance with current community standards.

The duly authorised organisers of the performance event have the final say on content of any proposed performance. Judges shall be advised that points will be deducted at scrutineer level if any breaches of these conditions occur.

- **3.** Entries on the day may be accepted if positions are available. Entries shall be restricted to one entry per contestant per section.
- 4. Competitors shall be judged on entertainment value, presentation skills, and selection of material.
- **5.** The time limit for performances by adults shall be restricted to a maximum of eight minutes, including preamble, and performances by juniors shall be restricted to a maximum of five minutes, including preamble. Two points per every 15 seconds, or part thereof, shall be deducted from each judge's score sheet for performances exceeding this limit.
- **6.** All entries in the poetry sections must be Australian Bush Poetry, (ie: rhymed and metred poetry about Australia, Australians, the Australian way of life or history). Poems must be performed from memory, and not read.
- 7. In the Modern and Traditional sections, contestants shall be required to provide the name and author of the poem on the Entry Form. Wherever possible, permission should be sought from an author to perform their poem prior to entry into the competition. "Anon" can only be claimed in relation to poems the authorship of which is genuinely unknown.
- **8.** Original poems must be Australian Bush Poetry written by the competitor. They can be Humorous or Serious. Original Humorous should be original in idea as well as content and not be based on a pre-existing joke.
- **9.** Poems which have won first place in the same competition previously shall not be performed by the same poet in the current competition.
- **10.** Except as otherwise provided, the judges' decisions shall be absolutely final and without further discussion. All matters relating to the carrying out of the competition remain with the duly authorized organisers and their representatives.
- **11**. State Championships shall be conducted under the ABPA "Guidelines for Australian Bush Poetry Competitions" (Guidelines). Judging sheets as described in the Guidelines shall apply. (See the ABPA website: www.abpa.org.au).
- **12.** Prize money shall be awarded for winners in all categories.

Every week a truck would stop here bringing groceries and mail and an old steam train would puff on by – you'd here its mournful wail. With the town so far away, a garden helped supply their food, plus a cow for milk and chooks for eggs helped feed her hungry brood.

Now I wonder, are such things remembered - are they even missed, sadly, most are long forgotten, or no longer now exist? So at last the daydream ends, with childhood flash backs fading fast and those memories of yesteryear, returned, back to the past.

However, the small number of poets was able to present five poems each. The appreciative intimate audience was captivated. A special thank you to Hugh from Swan Care for his assistance with the sound.

NB We have a new member Justin in our midst. Please make him welcome if you see him. He promised to recite at the next muster.

Stinger Nettleton was the compere and welcomed us to country. As it was NAIDOC week his poems addressed this theme.

Stinger Nettleton: <u>Cookalingee</u> by Oodgeroo Noonuccal (Kath Walker) A vociferous activist on behalf of the Aboriginal people, Oodgeroo Noonucca was born on North Stradbroke Island in 1920 and is noted as one of Australia's most prominent poets. Noonuccal's poems are deeply influenced by her personal experiences of colonialism. In <u>Cookalingee</u> she explores the dependency of the local Aboriginal people on hand outs from the cook.

Stinger Nettleton: <u>The Tail Light</u> by Bill Kearns. A cop pulls over a car with a faulty tail light. Sadly the owner reveals that is the least of his problems as his caravan is missing.

Christine Boult: <u>The Bush Girl</u> by Henry Lawson. A man is able to leave the bush in search of greener pastures while the girl he leaves behind waits trustingly for his return.

Christine Boult: <u>The Water Lily</u> by Henry Lawson. A woman mourns her young daughter who is drowned by walking on the leaves of the water lily.

John Hayes: <u>The Old Master</u> by C.J. Dennis A masterful rendition of this classic poem telling the story of a colourful bullock driver.

John Hayes: <u>The Droving Days</u> by Banjo Paterson A man remembers his past droving and saves an old horse to remind his of his past.

Heather Denholm: Settlement in the West by Heather Denholm

This poem is her version of how it happened that Western Australia is actually part of Australia and not a separate country. Even though a few porkies were told in the process. (H.D)

Heather Denholm: <u>The Man From Snowy River</u> by Banjo Paterson. A great rendition of this classic poem. "Story of a cross country horse race that the young bloke from snowy river won against terrible odds" (H.D.)

Robert Gunn: <u>Turbulence</u> by Murray Hartin. A *true* story about Bill Hayes experiencing his first aeroplane flight. He rides his swag to Adelaide and changes his mind about flying. Rob gave a wonderful introduction telling us the background of Bill's life.


