

President's Ramblings April 2024

Friday and Saturday between singers then a two hour show on the Sunday morning. Our usual high standard was maintained throughout and all poets were well received. David and Therese Higginson have been great supporters of Bush Poetry and have included us in many of their shows. Another event David and Therese are organising is the Mountain Country Music Muster at Mount Trio in the Stirling Ranges, first weekend in November. Last year was the first time for this event and it was a great success and is to become an annual muster. They are locked in to that weekend because of other events in the Albany district. To avoid further clashes, we have moved the date of our Toodyay Bush Poetry Festival to the following weekend, i.e. $8^{th} - 10^{th}$ November. The good news for us is that the change will mean the November muster can be held on the first Friday, same as the other months of the year.

Congratulations to Stinger on the success of the show he produced at the Roxy Lane Theatre last October. Alzheimer's, the Musical won the award for the best production for the year. We have thoroughly enjoyed other productions Stinger has been involved in but bush poetry events meant we had to miss a good show.

Sadly I have to report that Bob Brackenbury passed away recently. Bob was a keen member of WA Bush Poets and was a valuable member of the committee for some time. He housed the trailer and was always looking to make improvements to our equipment.

Changes to the committee I reported on in the February Bullytin have been reversed and it was confirmed at the last meeting that Stinger is still the secretary and Rodger remains vice-president.

Fairbridge Folk Festival which was to have been held shortly has been cancelled due to a lack of volunteers and insufficient ticket sales. This was an iconic festival on the WA calendar with which WA Bush Poets has had a long association. Many of our founding members were regular performers. Let's hope it can be revived and not lapse into the mists of time.

Moondyne Festival at Toodyay is on Sunday 5th May and we will be having a stall and reciting there. The new location in the grounds of the Anglican Church avoids the noise of generators at the food vans. This is a good day trip from Perth and an opportunity to see Toodyay at its best.

Heather Denholm is MC for the muster on 5th April. The first half will feature ANZAC poems and Heather has a very appropriate touch for the night.

I will be MC for the May muster and the first half will be a tribute to Chris Taylor. Several poets will be presenting his poems. While we knew and admired Chris as a poet, we did not know much about him apart from what we could glean through his poetry. His son Dan is planning to be at the muster so we might have a chance to gain some insight into Chris's life.

Congratulations

The Mystery of The Granites

Where the desert winds are sighing you imagine hearts once crying, at this long-forgotten graveyard where these people lie at rest.

And for me there is a feeling of a sadness never healing and I felt it on arrival as this story will attest.

It's a sadness always waiting never leaving or abating, harking back into the past now from a time that used to be. And for those here time is endless, long forgotten now and friendless and that sense of heartfelt loss and gloom is reaching out to me.

I imagine anguished weeping where a loved one is now sleeping, though no marker tells the storey or the reason for those tears. With this sadness never leaving there's a sense of endless grieving that persists here in these granites, even after all these years.

There's no headstone clues to ponder so confused I always wonder, why this sadness is here waiting every time that I pass by.

And it's something so compelling, yet my senses are rebelling - am I going mad I ask - or - is there something here awry?

For I can't deny this feeling that now has my senses reeling, in this place of haunting shadows where the truth is hard to find. Yet somewhere the answers waiting, and not knowing is frustrating and the lack of knowledge needed is what plays upon my mind.

Over time the scrubs invaded, and old memories have faded, as this graveyard lies forgotten in the vastness found outback. And a fence that was erected now lays tangled and neglected, adding to the brooding gloom found here so far from any track,

And a wave of sand is creeping over graves where some are sleeping and there's others also threatened by that fast-encroaching tide. It advances unimpeded for this battle's been conceded, as there's few who are aware of where these pioneers reside.

They're abandoned here for ever way out in the never, never, without road or track to follow that could lead you to this place. Here below this granite outcrop that once witnessed every teardrop, is where sleepers lie forgotten now without a name to trace.

So, a final look on leaving, now confused but still believing, there's an unexplained phenomenon defying logic here. And for me there's no denying there is something mystifying, but the answer still eludes me, and the reason is unclear.

As I leave, I'm discontented, scarred, and mentally tormented, by this overriding feeling here of sadness so surreal. For the answer is eluding near these granites stark and brooding and I go away still haunted by the anguish that I feel.

Terry and his wife Val stumbled onto this old graveyard miles from anywhere.

There were no roads or tracks that led to it, and at the time it was a really desolate looking place on the side a granite outcrop.

The first thing we noticed about it was this strange feeling of sadness possible brought on by the desolation of the place (and neither Val nor I are usually afflicted by any of this sort of thing). Let's face it we have come across a lot of strange things in our years of wandering. Interestingly each time we revisited this old graveyard that feeling of sadness persisted. The photo was taken after a rare wet period, so the place was transformed so to speak and the harshness was somewhat toned downed.

- 1. Entry fee per poem: Adults: \$10.00; Juniors: Free; No refunds if disqualified. If a detailed critique from the judges is required, please add an extra \$5 per poem.
- 2. No limit to number of entries and no line limit to poems
- 3. Poems must be the original work of the entrant and must not have been previously published for the profit of the author
- 4. A poem which has come first in any open written competition category is not permitted. If a poem should win one competition prior to the closing date of another competition in which the same poem is entered, the onus is on the author to notify the second competition organisers that his/her poem has become ineligible due to the contravention of entry conditions.
- 5. Poems must have very good rhyme and meter and be original with an Australian theme
- 6. A poem, which in the opinion of the judge contains offensive material, will be disqualified
- 7. The poem's must be sent electronically, unless this is not available, in which case they must be presented as follows: typed on white A4 size paper, with black printing in a plain font, size 10-12, with the name of the poem headed on each subsequent page and be numbered and stapled (see note below)
- 8. All poems must be received by the due date
- 9. The competition is conducted in accordance with ABPA guideline recommendations (refer to www.abpa.org.au/competitions)
- 10. Judging will be by judges approved by the ABPA
- 11. The judges' decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into
