Now that the dust has settled on the AGM and the Paterson and Lawson night, we can all learn from what was a very rewarding experience. Firstly we saw that with a bit of effort from the hard working Committee, we can attract a big audience. The total of 112 attendees far exceeded our previous CAY record of 87. We also saw that by separating the Membership Table from the Entry Table, we were able to process the people, without a long queue.

We also saw that 25 poems were too many for one night, especially as a few people added poems, which they had not registered with the Co-ordinator. We must also insist that poets,

who enter these feature events, can memorise their works to ensure professional performance. Apart from those minor points, we received continuous praise from people who attended, many of whom, took the trouble to phone members of the committee to express their enjoyment. We will endeavour to have another Feature Night like this one in March 2002.

The new-look Committee has begun its work for the New Year with some very interesting changes, which will see the Association rise to new professional heights. The most sweeping changes affect the "Wireless Hill Challenge 2002" competition. Following ideas put forward by Rod Lee and Kel Watkins, it was decided to limit the Heats to just 2 nights so that we do not take up too much time from our regular CAY programming. We are introducing a new category to the "Your Own Poetry" and "Others' Poetry", Competitions. This will be the "Masters Open", which will attract the finest performers to the Competition. Our normal Competition will then be restricted to those people who have not won a previous "Wireless Hill Challenge" in the category in which they are competing. See Page 7 for more details. We hope by doing this, we will encourage more people to enter the competitions with a better chance of winning.






Come All Ye July 2001





Profile of Val Read

Born in 1939, Val lived at Warraweena Station in the Flinders Ranges till she was five. This was the sister station to Beltana Station owned by Sir Thomas Elders, who brought the first camels and Afghans for exploration purposes. Later the family moved to Sliding Rock (Kadnia) where her stepfather operated the generators for the flooded copper mines.

In 1950 this pioneer lass moved to Leigh creek and lived in tents, while attending a 1-Teacher school where her first poetry was encouraged. Later schooling was in Adelaide and during her teenage years she came to WA. Here she met her "city lad" husband. They had 5 children – 4 boys and a girl. Val misses the country very much. It is her main source of her inspiration. In her book, she wrote "After 50 odd years I can still close my eyes and see vibrant carpets of beautiful Salvation Jane and Wild Hops covering the hillside. The steep escarpments of Aroona and crystal clear creeks lined by scented gums."

Changes to Wireless Hill Challenge Competition for 2002

The new Committee has decided to change the format of the Wireless Hill Challenge competition to be held on 26th January 2002. The changes outlined below are <u>draft only</u>. Members have until 31/8/2001 to comment on the proposals. Comments on the changes can be made by phoning Geoff Bebb on 9367 4963 or by emailing him at <u>geoff@surpac.com</u>. After reviewing the members' comments, nominations will be called-for in each of the competition categories in the September edition of the Newsletter.

The existing categories of "Own Poetry" and "Others' Poetry" will be renamed to "Own Poetry - Restricted" and "Others' Poetry - Restricted", while we will introduce two new categories "Own Poetry - Masters Open" and "Others' Poetry - Masters Open". The winners in all categories will receive a cash prize as well as the perpetual trophy. Second and third will also receive cash prizes.

The "Restricted" categories will be open to those <u>Financial Members</u>, who have not WON a previous Wireless Hill Challenge in that category.

For example, Cobber Lethbridge, Chis Sattler and Peter Capp who have previously won in the "Own Poetry" category **would not** be able to enter "Own' Poetry - Restricted", but **would** be able to enter the "Own Poetry - Masters Open" category.

Likewise, Cobber Lethbridge, Ron Evans and Rusty Christensen, who have previously won in the "Others' Poetry" category **would not** be able to enter "Others' Poetry - Restricted", but **would** be able to enter the "Others' Poetry - Masters Open" category. Both Open Masters' Categories will be truly "Open" – ie open to every Financial Member.

The Committee hopes that by having these restricted class competitions, we will produce more winners and provide a growth path for newer members into the Open Class competitions. If this new format is successful, we will probably introduce the format into the Yarn spinners' and Written Competition categories.

There will only be two Heats this year – in November and December. Nominations for the Heats will be made in writing to Geoff Bebb, who will be the principal co-ordinator for the Heats. Members will have to nominate the works they wish to present and the night of their preference. The finalists for the Wireless Hill Challenge 2002 will not be announced until after the second heat – so as to ensure a professional make-up to the Finals.

Poets wishing to enter the "Open Written Competition" please be aware that the winner will be called upon to **recite** their winning entry at Wireless Hill.

CWA 77th Annual Conference – verse recitation competition

The coordinator of this event has asked the WA Bush Poets Association to assist with the judging of their verse recitation competition. Rusty Christensen and Geoff Bebb have offered to assist with this task. This suggests that our Association is becoming more widely known in poetry and country circles and has skills that we can share with others.

Australian Bush Poetry Championships 2002 and 2003

The association has put in a bid to host these competitions for the APBA. We feel that our Committee of eleven is a very experienced bunch of ex-business people, with a wide range of talent at organisation and staging events. Most of the Committee members are retired or semi-retired, which means that they have the time to carry out the myriad of tasks associated with hosting a major event. We are computer literate, with our own email, database and desktop publishing capabilities. We also have the services of qualified Accounting and Auditing personnel. I enclose a copy of last month's Newsletter as evidence of the quality of our desktop publishing capabilities.

In addition to the talent on the Committee, we are confident of being able to attract Sponsorship of the event, through local business as well as the Melville Council, which has been a major supporter of our organisation.

Should we be successful in this bid, we hope we can count on the support of the entire Association in this very challenging endeavour
